The Commission aims to reply to such opinions within three months. The Commission also replies within the framework of the political dialogue to reasoned opinions received under the subsidiarity control mechanism where the thresholds for triggering the 'yellow' or 'orange' card procedures have not been met. Most national parliaments have meetings with members of the Commission on a regular basis. Commission participation in inter-parliamentary meetings and conferences. Commission officials' participation in meetings with national Parliament committees and representatives, on request. Annual reports.
